FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Jeremiah was a prophet during the time known as the Babylonian Captivity. This was when Babylon ruled over Israel. Babylon had run off with Israel's fanciest treasures (many from the Temple), as was the custom of the time, and removed Israel's most prominent citizens, those most capable of leading a rebellion against them, shipping them up to Babylon and putting them to work for the empire. To those who were taken, the greatness of Israel, all who mattered, were gone. Only the dregs were left. (I would like to point out that even Israelite princesses didn't qualify for being moved to Babylon, so it is possible that the elite's view was slightly skewed.) Anyway, Jeremiah is a prophet living in Israel among all those "dregs" who are keeping the country going and the economy humming. He has some not so sunny things to say about Israel's actions and says that this Babylonian Captivity is going to be a long and nasty business, and, at least for the moment, God is on the Babylonians' side, not theirs. Now of course, any good prophet didn't simply have to deliver their message, they had to find a way to get people to listen to their message. So this wasn't so much like sedate Sunday pew sitting as some street preaching with flair for theatrics. To visualize his message to his audience, Jeremiah wore a wooden yoke over his shoulders, the kind you'd find on oxen, to symbolize the yoke of the Babylonians under which Israel was to continue laboring because of all they had done. But prophets were more common than you might imagine. One of his contemporaries, the prophet, Hananiah, had a more popular message. He preached that Israel's freedom from Babylon was imminent. It was all going to be ok. Of course, this is also street theater, getting one's message across. So what does he do with this attention getting doom and gloom guy who's preaching the exact opposite of what he's saying? He strides over, grabs that wooden yoke, and breaks the wood over his knee, declaring that that's what God's about to do. Of course, Jeremiah's not going to take that lying down so what does he do? He comes back with another yoke, but this one's made of iron. Good luck to Hananiah trying to break that one.

Anyway, these two are having a go at each other and Hananiah is sticking with his predictions of a sunny future, the return of peace and prosperity. Jeremiah, who turns out to be right in

the end, points out that the great prophets have prophesied a great many nasty things: war, pestilence, and famine against any and all comers. Any prophet who could prophesy peace and actually be right? Now that prophet would truly have to be from God! Because what God has to say isn't all sunshine and roses and it's not something we always want to hear. We want the sunny words of Hananiah. We want to hear that we did good. When we get a bad report, it feels like an attack, and we get defensive. We turn on those who would deliver the bad news. There's a reason the prophets weren't always that popular in their communities.

This is why Jesus speaks so highly of welcoming a prophet. It wasn't the most common occurrence. We all like the good news. God loves us. God cares for us. God wants the best for us. God will grant us eternal life in the face of death. What we don't like is when someone reminds us that we can behave pretty shabbily. Our gratitude for what we have is lacking and we keep refusing to share with our neighbors, no matter how many lessons we've had on the importance of sharing. We don't want to hear that God had to die for us. We don't want to hear that repentance isn't a matter of words, but of deeds. That out of all we've been given, maybe we could make something out of it. That we hurt the vulnerable and shut out those that we most need to hear. Yet Jesus urges us to hear, for "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward."

Dear Lord, give us ears to hear, even when we don't want to, give us eyes to see what we would shield ourselves from, give us the strength to do what we shirk, give us hearts full, not of ourselves, but of your love. Teach us what it means to be your people. Help us to walk in your ways and to live in love.

When Edina Nagy-Kovacs of Nagcsepely, Hungary, was in her 3rd trimester of pregnancy, she saw a sign in a hardware store for the "Backyard Garden and Little Workshops" program. Edina and her husband had recently moved to the area, and they were having trouble finding jobs because of their limited education.

The Little Workshops program, run by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Hungary and supported by ELCA World Hunger, provides practical skills training in rural western Hungary. Economic opportunity is especially limited there for women and the marginalized Roma People.

Edina began coming to the workshop once or twice a week and learned to weave scarves, stoles and towels. After giving birth, she brought her baby with her a she continued her training. She now contributes to her family's income by selling what she makes, and she is learning other new skills such as basket weaving.
